

- FIELD GUIDE --SHOOTING PHOTOS & VIDEOS

As you're visiting project sites, this guide will help you to take the best photos and video to help with our website, case studies, social media and sales.

FRAMING



Do:

- Hold the phone horizontally
- Use the back camera
- Record for at least 10 seconds
- Hold the phone on the edges so your fingers don't show up in the image
- Get a case for your phone so it's easier to hold

× Don't:

- Hold the phone vertically
- Use the selfie camera
- Block the internal microphone or hit it while recording—the mic picks up the noise of your hand moving
- Put distracting objects in your frame reflections, anything that blocks part of the shot, a person who doesn't belong in the shot, anything that draws your eye away from the main focus, etc.

FOCUSING



The camera will autofocus to what it thinks is the focus, normally what's in the middle of the screen or a face.

Do:

- Tap once on the object you want in focus on your screen; the phone will zone in on it
- Reset your focus every time you change your framing

🗴 Don't:

• Assume the camera chose the right thing to have in focus

ZOOMING



Do:

- Move physically closer to your subject when trying to get a closer shot
- Get a variety of shots—far away, close up, somewhere in the middle, stand still, or move around your subject

🗴 Don't:

- Zoom in using the phone itself unless it is impossible to physically move closer
- Zoom in all the way when shooting video, it will be too shaky to use

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LIGHTING



Your phone will automatically adjust to how bright it is.

Do:

- Adjust the brightness manually, if needed: hold down on the screen until the AE/AF lock appears
 - On an iPhone, you can then slide up and down on the screen until the brightness looks correct
 - For Android, it will then show a light bulb at the bottom of the screen that you can slide left and right to adjust the brightness
- Keep your subject bathed in light as much as possible
- Avoid shadows
- Keep the sun/light source above you or behind your back as you shoot
- Face your interviewee so the sun is lighting their entire face

× Don't:

- Point the camera directly at the sun
- Put an object in front of the sun so it is silhouetted
- Don't put an indoor object in front of a window so it is silhouetted
- Have shadows anywhere on your interviewee—rotate them or move to a new spot where there isn't a shadow on their face
- Use the flash unless absolutely necessary

INTERVIEWS — AUDIO



Listen to the audio with headphones/earbuds after recording it to make sure you can hear them.

🗸 Audio Do's:

With external microphone

- Use a wired microphone in interviews as much as possible
- Have your interviewee weave the microphone under their shirt and clip it to their collar. This hides the wire and gives a polished look

With internal phone microphone

- Move to a quiet place
- Stay close to your interview subject
- Ask them to speak loudly and clearly

× Audio Don'ts:

- Talk while shooting video
- Walk away without checking that the interview actually recorded with sound
- Wrap the microphone cord tightly around anything. It will break

INTERVIEWS — VIDEO



✓ Video Do's:

- Keep their entire head and shoulders in the shot
- Stand at their eye level
- Start over if they mess up
- Put them in the middle of the frame or slightly to one side

× Video Don'ts:

- Stand them in front of a window
- Cut them off at the bottom of the frame at an awkward break point on their body, like their neck, elbows, wrists, etc.
- Put them too far to one side of the frame
- Have them too far away from you

CAMERA MOVEMENT



V Do:

- When moving the camera as if you're taking a panoramic shot, plan a starting and stopping point on the scenery. We cannot make an edit in the middle of the movement
- Dig your elbows into your sides to make a mini tripod to stabilize your shot
- Move slowly and turn your whole body
- Keep your movement short
- Use a selfie stick if you have one

🗴 Don't:

- Move so quickly your audience gets sick
- Just move your arms
- Hold the phone with your arms outstretched in front of you, it will be shaky

ALWAYS



- Take a test shot to make sure everything looks and sounds good
- Check your shot afterward to make sure it's to your liking
- Practice—shoot something more than once if you don't love it
- Put your phone in airplane mode so nothing interrupts your shot. The phone will pick up the noise of your phone vibrating or ringing
- Send us whatever you shoot and we can decide if we use it or not—we will happily take a look at ANYTHING you shoot

NEVER



• Be nervous! Just have fun with it. 😊
